Tree of Lives Family:

Our Board of Directors started 2022 with a long-awaited return to see our Kenyan partners after the travel shutdowns of the previous two years. We were excited and encouraged to see our ministries thriving despite our prolonged physical absence and the myriad other challenges of COVID. We found that the roots we planted so many years ago were able to continue growing in new directions and bearing fruit because, from the beginning, we had cultivated partners. It was overwhelmingly hopeful to know that those on the ground every day are equally empowered and invested in our shared battle against HIV/AIDS and poverty. We were also keenly aware of how richly blessed we are in you, our donors, who have laid the essential groundwork that makes it all possible. Your faithfulness, trust, and generosity are the cornerstones of this successful foundation and all that has followed. Thank you, thank you, thank you, thank you.

As the year unfolded, we moved forward with invigorated momentum. We were able to resume our regular pilgrimages, beginning in October. We worked with longtime partner George Mbugwa Kimani, "Teacher George," to establish a Scholar Program for our Joy Village children to shepherd them through high school and into college where they can prepare for success as they move into adulthood. We were able to support an incredible World AIDS Day event for our Holy Family Center Youth Mentors that reached over 5,000 people - more than quadruple the number reached at last year's event. God is good.

Yet new and increased challenges have also emerged. Food costs have doubled and show no sign of going down. Salaries, meanwhile, have remained the same, for those who were blessed to have a job at all. The backlog of issues from the pandemic has continued to make it difficult for patients to find transportation to the clinic for their HIV medication. Many have fallen into non-compliance with their drug treatment regimens. Youth and young adults have been particularly affected as their group support networks had to be suspended due to COVID. There is still great need and much to do.

We are eager to get to work in 2023 and confident that the Lord will make a way as together we serve the beautiful people of Kenya. Thank you again. Your love, support, and prayers make more of a difference than you will ever know.

EQUALIZE AND END THE TRIPLE THREAT

December 1 is International World AIDS Day. It is set aside for the global community to renew its commitment to ending AIDS as a public health threat. For the last 20 years, Nazareth Hospital and the Holy Family Center have contributed toward the sustained efforts to control and manage HIV, making significant achievements in Kenya.

Data from The Joint United Nations Programme on HIV/AIDS (UNAIDS) on the global HIV response reveals that during the last two years of the COVID-19 pandemic, HIV progress has faltered and resources have shrunk. Nazareth Hospital and the Holy Family Center are working to embrace the Kenyan campaign to tackle the inequalities exacerbating the problem, including economic, social, cultural and legal disparities.

In Kenya, the Ministry of Health, used the Swahali word "#SAWAZI-SHA" meaning "Flatten" as the campaign tagline with the goal of ending the triple threat, meaning:

- 1. Zero new infections
- 2. Zero teenage pregnancies
- 3. Zero gender based violence

Ambassadors traveled to popular gathering spots including marketplaces, flower farms, boda boda (motorcycle) sheds, bus stops and even a mobile road show from Nazareth to Ruaka, a neighboring town. This creative outreach allowed them to reach 5,000 people on that day.

During this event, 15 Holy Family Center peer mentors participated. They tested 817 young people for HIV, 13 of whom were enrolled in the Holy Family Center program, and 25 of whom were put on pre-exposure measures. Those living with HIV are on follow-up programs and were advised on starting treatment early so that they can live a full, healthy and productive life. The clients with negative tests received messages on prevention and risk reduction measures.



Kenya is a world leader in the number of solar power systems installed per capita. More Kenyans are now turning to solar power every year rather than make connections to the country's electric grid. This is due to a number of challenges related to connecting to the national grid, with the first and foremost being the cost of setup and the high cost of buying power from Kenya Power.

This year, Tree of Lives received a generous donation to convert the Joy Village to solar power, freeing it from municipal electricity. The annual utility bill for the Joy Village is \$22,000. The solar panels will pay for themselves in less than three years and virtually eliminate the Joy Village's electric bill.

The solar panels were installed over the roof of House 7 and over the laundry room roof.

What an amazing opportunity for the Joy Village to use renewable energy and decrease the bills they have to pay.

The Scholars Program was created in 2008 to help further education for the children of the Allamano School and help with tuition for the Joy Village kids once they enter high school. Without this program, many students would pause their education. Last year, Tree of Lives arranged for a Kenyan community-based organization to hire Teacher George (George Mbugwa Kimani) to supervise our Scholars Program. He worked to support Kenyan students from primary school through high school and, in some cases, post-high school studies. His ultimate goal is to help them find a well-paying job to support themselves and their families.

We are so proud of our Joy Village and Allamano School scholars! Ten of the Joy Village scholars started Form 1 (equivalent to 9th grade) this year. The children apply to different high schools and are accepted based on academics and other indicators.

In our Allamano Scholar program, we have one hundred and thirteen active scholars. Out of the 113, one graduated from university and two graduated from secondary school and have applied to university and college. In December, we had two scholars graduate from secondary school, twelve from class eight and two going from grade six to junior secondary. All of the students will be promoted to their next grade.

Each quarter, Teacher George holds scholar meetings for the students and their parents. At these times, he goes over the progress of each student to ensure they are following all of the guidelines to keep their scholarships.

BOXES OF LOVE DISTRIBUTED OVER THE HOLIDAYS

This year's Boxes of Love distribution was more meaningful than ever as food prices in Kenya have soared. Tree of Lives distributed 200 Boxes of Love to children and their families enrolled in the Holy Family Center and 120 gift packs to children that attend the Allamano School. Thirty youth and adolescents from the HFC Youth Mentor Program volunteered to package and distribute the household gift packs. The boxes provide enough materials to last through the Christmas holiday, or about four weeks. In each box, recipients received:

School bag
Refillable water bottle
Toothbrush
2 liter of cooking fat
2 kilograms of wheat flour
10 kilograms of maize flour
72 kilograms rice
1 kilogram of green Mung beans
Bar of soap

*some students also receive school shoes

HOLY FAMILY CENTER CONTINUES TO CHANGE LIVES



HIV PREVENTION

6,050 tested for HIV

554 newly identified HIV positives

522 newly enrolled in the program (*some of the newly HIV positive identified are linked to other clinics in closer proximity to their residence).

HIV CARE AND TREATMENT

6,467 patients currently on antiretroviral therapy (ART)

94% overall viral suppression

95% retained on ART from time of initiation

100% of TB/HIV co-infected patients on ART

100% TB screening of HIV infected individuals (*TB is the major cause of mortality in HIV infected patients)



PREVENTION OF MOTHER TO CHILD TRANSMISSION

138 newly identified HIV positive mothers

100% ART compliance for HIV infected pregnant mothers

0% mother to child transmission (*for past 9 years there has been no mother to child transmission for mothers enrolled in the program).
